


"So then this little sailor dude whips out a can of spinach, this crazy music starts playin', and ... well, just look at this place."



I arrived in Annapolis a couple days before the reunion was to begin. The Graduate Hotel in Annapolis has photos of well-known Naval Academy graduates, and upon checking in, as with other hotels, I was given two key cards. But these cards had photos on them, one of which caused me to do a double take. It had the photo of our former shipmate, Admiral Natter (Lt. Natter while on the Bradley). When I explained to the woman checking me in that I'd served on the Bradley when Admiral Natter had AND that I was there to attend the Bradley reunion she became rather animated and called her co-workers over to share that bit of info with them. She said that while they were accustomed to people recognizing other Academy graduates (Roger Staubach and Jimmy Carter for example), they didn't recall anyone staying with them who'd actually served with one of their Annapolis key card alums. Each morning as I walked passe the front desk the clerk who checked me in greeted me by name. She said she remembered my name because of the Admiral Natter/Bradley connection. Very cool!

Then later, a sharp-eyed shipmate noticed that the "owner" showing on the end of each rooms "sea desk" was – you guessed it: Robert J Natter. I think it fair to say that we were quite pleased to see our former shipmate so well represented at our hotel and that we were proud to have been associated with Admiral Natter (however loosely) once upon a time.



## Side notes (so to speak)

Before the reunion in Annapolis, I spent about a week in Washington DC. During my working life I spent a fair amount of time there and when I had time always enjoyed visiting the museums and various monuments and sites. On this trip, in addition to returning to many of those sites, I enjoyed a mini reunion of sorts, visiting with a couple of former Peace Corps colleagues.

One of those days my wife and I were walking past the Army Navy Club and so popped in to see what was what. We weren't allowed to wander around but were allowed into their library. While checking that out I noticed a section that contained the Naval Academy "year books". On a whim I began looking for one of the officers I knew had attended Annapolis and was aboard the Bradley when I was – Ltjg Dick Bottenberg. And yup, there he was. This is what I found. I hope Mr. Battenberg doesn't mind my sharing it here. When I shared the photo with a shipmate at the reunion who also knew Ltjg Bottenberg, his comment was – "Nice haircut".

Bot's greatest problem at the Academy was getting people os spell his name correctly, as each day a new wentry to his colection of mangled Bottenbergs found its rightful place on the subletin board. Academically, a firm believer in "don't overwork yourself," get pleanty of rest, and relax often in front of he television, he easily managed his Oceanography Major with only an occasional glance at the books. No matter how erious the situation, Bott's timely comments always neightened our sphits. Naval aviation and marriage to a sweetneart from his native California avait him after graduation. Then, since my wife had conflicting obligations at home she left DC before me, leaving me with a free day and a half. I'd often thought about going into the National Archives to see if I could find Bradley deck logs not yet digitized and on their web site but had never had the time. I took this opportunity to do that.

Upon arrival, after passing through security, I met a very helpful employee that informed me I needed to visit their site located in College Park, Maryland because that's where those deck logs were kept. At first, I was pretty bummed, but then she told me they had a <u>free</u> shuttle bus that traveled to their College Park site every hour! It was too late in the day to head out there just then, so I returned the next morning and caught their shuttle out to College Park which took about an hour.

I wish I'd known ahead of time what was involved with getting access to the archives – I'd have been on the first shuttle out there – getting in was quite a process! In addition to the trip out, I had to go through an orientation and then take a test that also took about an hour. They have many rules and are <u>very</u> strict! For example, I wasn't allowed to take in a pad of paper, but I had some notes on dates I wanted to look up on a page, so I was able to take in that page out of the notepad, but it had to be stamped and was then inspected by security before proceeding. No pen or pencil. No pack. No hat. Etc. Whew!!


Because I wasn't familiar with the process and didn't arrive until about 1200 my time was limited, but the staff went out of their way to help me find the records I was looking for. They were able to locate and retrieve <u>original</u> deck logs from the Bradley, as well as from the USS Mullany (my father in law's destroyer that was hit by a kamikaze off Okinawa in WW II).

I was stunned to see the original deck logs from the day my father in law's ship was hit, and to see his original signature from that day!

Anyway, one of the Bradley deck logs I was looking for was from the day the Ranger's helo was accidentally shot down by one of her own planes. Having seen (and included the Ranger deck log from that day in a previous newsletter) I was curious what was written in the Bradley deck log.


With all the restrictions and precautions the National Archives has in place when entering their facilities, I was very pleased that they allowed my small Sony camera in. With that I was allowed to take photos of the archived deck logs. Below is a photo of the *original* Bradley deck log from that terrible day in July 1974 (I've clipped out the times before and after the accident to save space).


